City to Restore Flour Mill Used by Washington's Army

Gerritsen's Mill at Marine Park, Brooklyn — where tide power ground flour for Washington's Army—will be restored as a shrine and recreation spot, the Park Department announced.

Built in 1685 by the Gerritsen family, the mill operated nearly two centuries, and was kept workable until the city acquired Marine Park.

Souvenir hunters promptly started collecting, and parts of the frame and interior disappeared. These will be replaced under plans drawn by Aymar Embury, Park Department architect.

Two more Brooklyn playgrounds have been approved, one at Bedford Ave. and Ave. X, and the other at New Utrecht Ave. and 71st St. Each will have a recreation building.
